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## **EMPHASIS IN WRITING STUDIES - 2022-23**

The Emphasis in Writing Studies, available to doctoral students in Comparative Literature, Education, English, Feminist Studies, Linguistics, and Religious Studies, is intended to provide a background in the theory, methods, and functions of Writing Studies with an eye toward applying for professional positions (as faculty members, writing consultants, or other writing professionals) in Writing Studies, composition/rhetoric, or writing intensive positions in other disciplines. Candidates pursuing the Emphasis in Writing Studies must also fulfill the departmental and University requirements related to their degree program.

Writing Studies is a research-based field that focuses broadly on the analysis of the production, consumption, and circulating of writing in specific contexts. The field brings together sub-disciplines such as composition and rhetoric, genre studies, and textual and discourse analysis. Writing Studies bridges theory and practice as researchers center their work in specific contexts (often academic disciplines) and look at the ways in which writing develops and perpetuates activities within those contexts. At the same time, researchers are also often teachers of academic writing (in various disciplines) and work with students to develop strategies for analyzing writing, reading, and critical analysis in those disciplines.
